Focus Poetry

The teacher is responsible for carefully selecting appropriate pieces of poetry that will provide a challenge, but keep enthusiasm and interest at a high level for students. The focus poem is presented in a "surprise" atmosphere. Jill Eggleston describes it as "unwrapping a special present for the kids each week." So, it needs to be "unveiled" on day one. Copy each poem onto chart paper so that it is easy to read with a large group. (At the end of the week, the poem chart may be added to previous selections to make a poetry big book. Kids love it!)

Monday:

Introduce the focus poem. Read the poem to the children. Invite them to predict what it might be about. Briefly discuss the message.

Tuesday:

Read the focus poem together. Discuss any new or interesting vocabulary.

Wednesday:

Read the poem together.

Use the poem to introduce or reinforce any print concepts or other targets in the language areas, including spelling.

Thursday:

Read the focus poem together.

Move in some way to the rhythm of the poem (e.g. clap, stamp, thump) Change the way the poem has been said (e.g. make a tune for it, read it like a rap or a chant.)

Friday:

Photocopy and glue the poem into each child's individual poetry book and allow them to illustrate it in their own way.

Students take their poetry notebooks home to share with family and friends.
